

The undersigned, Detective Scott Branfuhr, being duly sworn, does depose and state that he is a member of the New Haven Police Department since July 29, 1989. At all times mentioned herein, I was acting as a member of said department. The following facts and circumstances are stated from personal knowledge and observations, as well as information received from other police officers acting in their official capacity and from official police reports and statements made from prudent and credible witnesses.

The undersigned, Detective Chris Perrone, being duly sworn, does depose and state that he is a member of the New Haven Police Department since March 24, 1997. At all times mentioned herein, I was acting as a member of said department. The following facts and circumstances are stated from personal knowledge and observations, as well as information received from other police officers acting in their official capacity and from official police reports and statements made from prudent and credible witnesses.

On September 8th 2009, at approximately 2240hrs, Yale University Police Officers responded to 188 Lawrence St Apt 3 New Haven, CT to investigate a missing person complaint. Officers met with Natalie Powers who reported that her roommate, Annie Le, did not return home after her last class. Ms Le was enrolled in a doctorate program at Yale University. Powers said she had not received any phone calls from Le on this day which was very unusual.

Ning Ning, Le's classmate, and friend reported that she did not hear from Le on September 8th 2009. Ning reported that Le was last seen wearing a white sweater, green t-shirt, brown skirt and brown necklace.

Johnathan Widawski, Le's fiancé who lives in New York City, reported, via cellular telephone phone, that he last heard from Le on September 8th 2009 at approximately 0800hrs. Widawski reported that Le was scheduled to telephone him at 1900hrs but never received her call. Widawski reported that Le did not have a history of mental illness, drug or alcohol abuse and has never been reported missing.

Attempts to locate Le at her office, located at 333 Cedar Street room 225 in New Haven, yielded a negative result although her purse containing her cellular telephone and wallet along with her shoes and daily planner were located there. A check with the area hospitals for Le also yielded a negative result.

A printout of Ms Le's electronic key card log for September 8th 2009, showed that her card was last used on September 8th 2009 at 1011hrs at the Yale Animal Research Center, room G13, located at 10 Amistad Street. A key card is required to enter each of the rooms in the building. Such card registers the time of entry however a card need not be swiped in order to exit a room. Such facility is near her office and is commonly visited by her as part of her studies. The

On September 10th 2009, investigators from the Federal Bureau of Investigation met with Clark at the Animal Research Center who reported that he is an Animal Technician III and has worked for Yale University for the past five years. Clark reported that his is responsible for maintaining the animals in rooms G24, G33, and G13.

Clark reported that on September 8th 2009, at approximately 10:30hrs, he observed Le working in room G13 wearing a brown shirt and yellow lab coat. Clark reported that he left room G13 for lunch at approximately 12:00hrs and later returned at approximately 1230hrs. Clark reported that Le then gathered her belongings and left the room, between 1230hrs and 1245hrs, carrying her notebook and two bags of mouse food. Clark reported that a fire alarm cleared the building between 1300hrs and 13:30hrs. Investigators observed Clark to have a scratch on his left bicep that he reported was sustained at home form one of his cats.

On September 10th 2009, Officer Wood met with Yale student Rachel Roth who reported that she had found a box of "All wipes", on a steel push cart, containing blood spatter inside of room G13. Roth led Officer Wood to room G13 and pointed out the box. Clark entered room G13 while Ofc Wood was present and walked over to the steel push cart, looked at the box of wipes and positioned himself between the box and Officer Wood. Clark then repositioned the box of wipes so the blood spatter now faced away from Officer Wood. Roth reported that Clark then leaned against the steel cart and attempted to make small talk with Officer Wood. FBI investigators removed Clark from room G13 at approximately 1530hrs at which time Officer Wood returned the box of wipes to its original position. The box of wipes was subsequently photographed and seized as evidence.

Some time later, Mr Clark came into the room (G13) with a box of SOS pads and a bottle of cleaning solution. Mr Clark then proceeded to clean the floor grate/drain with the SOS pads and the cleaning solution. This grate is located under the only sink in this room.

Ofc Wood was later shown a photograph of Raymond Clark. She identified the person in the photo as the person who came into the lab.

On 9-9-09, Ofc Wood was present when Ofc Donnelly of the Yale University Police was interviewing Mr. Clark. Ofc Donnelly told Ofc Wood that Mr Clark said he (Clark) was the last person to see Ms Le before she disappeared.

On 9-12-09, Investigators from the Connecticut State Police Western District Major Squad processed the lower floor at 10 Amistad St. for physical evidence related to this investigation. During the processing of this scene, Investigators located locker rooms on this floor. These

Investigators seized as evidence a pair of work boots in the lower left cubby hole below a bank of lockers in the Yale Animal Research Center. These boots appeared to have blood spatters on them. The back of these boots were labeled "Ray C". Also seized was a navy blue medical scrub top. This scrub had what appeared to be a blood stain on the front left breast.

Two unnumbered lockers located directly above this cubby were locked with pad locks. Two unlocked lockers on the far right of this locker bank were labeled "RAY".

Investigators located a laundry bag labeled "RAY" hanging on a peg on the wall opposite the lockers. This bag was open at the top and contained numerous scrubs.

On 9-13-09, Sgt Vasquez was able to view the video surveillance of the main entry of 10 Amistad St. captured on 9-8-09. Mr Clark was seen passing through these doors wearing blue scrubs several times. At 1554hrs, Mr Clark was seen exiting these doors wearing a dark colored baseball cap, a dark colored shirt and jeans.

Investigators inspected the Investigator locker room located on this floor. Upon entering this locker room, a bad odor was immediately detected. This locker room contains fourteen lockers. Six of these lockers are locked. One with a "Master" Pad lock and the other five with "Master" combination locks with black dials. These lockers are unlabeled, however several are labeled.

These affiants believe that items contained in these lockers and laundry bag may produce evidence relevant to this crime and will further this investigation.

These affiants have personal knowledge, based upon their training and experience, that crimes of violence involve a struggle, a break, the use of weapons and other instrumentalities, and/or the element of unpredictability; the person or persons participating in the commission of a violent crime is/are in contact with physical surrounding in a forceful or otherwise detectable manner; there is often an attempt to alter, destroy, remove, clean up, or cover up evidence of a crime; traces may be left in the form of blood, saliva, hair, fibers, fingerprints, palmprints, footprints, shoeprints, blunt force instruments, dirt, dust and soil, glass and plastic fragments, or containers and items containing traces of any of the above-mentioned articles; many of the above items are minute and must be analyzed by the state forensic laboratories.



The undersigned, Detective Sergeant Alfonso Vazquez, being duly sworn, does depose and state that he is a member of the New Haven Police Department since January 24, 1992. At all times mentioned herein, I was acting as a member of said department. The following facts and circumstances are stated from personal knowledge and observations, as well as information received from other police officers acting in their official capacity and from official police reports and statements made from prudent and credible witnesses.

The undersigned, Detective Scott Branfuhr, being duly sworn, does depose and state that he is a member of the New Haven Police Department since July 29, 1989. At all times mentioned herein, I was acting as a member of said department. The following facts and circumstances are stated from personal knowledge and observations, as well as information received from other police officers acting in their official capacity and from official police reports and statements made from prudent and credible witnesses.

On September 8th 2009, at approximately 10:40 pm, Yale University Police Officers responded to 188 Lawrence St Apt 3 New Haven, CT to investigate a missing person complaint. Officers met with Natalie Powers who reported that her roommate, Annie Le, did not return home after her last class. Powers said she had not received any phone calls from Le on this day which was very unusual.

A subsequent joint investigation conducted by members of the Federal Bureau of Investigation New Haven field office, the Yale University Police Department and the New Haven Police Department led to interviews of friends and family of Annie Le who all confirmed her disappearance. The investigation also showed that Annie Le worked at the Yale Animal Research Center located at 10 Amistad Street, lower level.

Investigators from the Federal Bureau of Investigation New Haven Field Office, the Yale Police Department and the New Haven Police Department reviewed, among other things, electronic video surveillance of 10 Amistad Street and security key-card usage by Annie Le. Video footage showed Annie Le entering 10 Amistad Street on September 8th, 2009, at approximately 10:09 am. A printout of Ms Le's electronic key card log for September 8th 2009 showed that her card was last used on September 8th 2009 at 10:11 am, at the Yale Animal Research Center, room G-13, located at 10 Amistad Street lower level. Further review of all security cameras both interior and exterior to include video footage from exterior surrounding areas showed that Annie Le never exited 10 Amistad Street since her arrival on September 8th, 2009. The FBI confirmed that all exits from 10 Amistad Street are covered by video surveillance.

On Wednesday September 10th, 2009, Officer Sabrina Wood from the Yale Police Department was approached by Rachel Roth, a graduate student and Coworker of Annie Le. Roth showed Officer Wood a box of "WIPE ALLS," that had what appeared to be blood splatter. The box of wipes was on a steel push cart located inside of lab room G-13. Officer Wood stood guard and awaited the arrival of Agents from the Federal Bureau of Investigation.

Wherefore the undersigned requests that a warrant may issue commanding a proper officer to search said person or to enter into or upon said place or thing, search the same, and take into custody all such property

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While waiting for the F.B.I. a lab technician, later identified as Raymond Clark, came in and out of G-13 several times. During one of the times he came into the room, Raymond walked over to the cart and looked at the box of wipes. Raymond then stood between Officer Wood and the cart, and then turned and faced Officer Wood. While turning towards Officer Wood, Raymond moved the box of wipes from the far left corner to the far right corner and purposely turned the box so that the blood splatter was facing to the right hand side of the cart away from plain sight. Once Raymond moved the box of wipes, he then leaned up against the cart and made small talk with Officer Wood. At this point F.B.I Special Agent Jim Wines and Special Agent Lisa MacNamara came into G-13. The Agents briefly spoke with Officer Wood and then asked Raymond to exit G-13. When Raymond left the room, Officers Wood moved the wipes box back to its original position on the cart. Officer Wood moved the tissue box by pushing it with her fingernail.

Sometime later, Raymond Clark came back into the room and began scrubbing the floor grate/drain with the SOS pads and cleaning solution. Officer Wood thought it was unusual that Raymond was scrubbing the drain because it did not appear to need cleaning.

In a subsequent interview Agents also spoke with Sergeant Jay Jones of the Yale Police Department. Sergeant Jones confirmed seeing Raymond Clark on the floor inside the G-13 lab scrubbing the floor underneath the sink, near the drain. Clark was using a cleansing pad or brush to clean the floor. Sergeant Jones thought this was odd because the floor was clean. Sergeant Jones did not observe anything that needed cleaning.

Sergeant Jones also stated he saw Raymond Clark walk past the cart that had the tissue box on it in lab room G-13 and make contact with the cart. Sergeant Jones stated that at some other point Raymond Clark did accidently bump the tissue box, however, the integrity of the evidence was not disturbed.

On September 10, 2009, at approximately 3:10 pm, members of the Federal Bureau of Investigation New Haven Field Office Evidence Response Team collected the above referenced box. Said box was subsequently submitted to the State of Connecticut Forensic Laboratory for examination. The preliminary result of the examination of the blood spatter tested positive for the presence of human blood.

Officer Jennifer Garcia, Yale University Police Officer, spoke with Agents of the New Haven Federal Bureau of Investigations field office and stated that while responding to the basement of 10 Amistad Animal Research Center a male named Raymond Clark approached her and stated he knew Annie Le. Raymond Clark stated that he left the Amistad building at 12:45 pm on September 08th, 2009. According to Raymond Clark, Annie Le left the building 15 minutes before him and before the fire alarm was tripped. Garcia also added that Raymond Clark changed his clothes at least once when the F.B.I was processing the scene.

Wherefore the undersigned requests that a warrant may issue commanding a proper officer to search soid person or to enterinto or upon said place or thing, search the same, and take into custody all such property.

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As part of the investigation investigators spoke with co-workers of Annie Le. Particularly, on September 10th 2009, investigators from the Federal Bureau of Investigation met with Clark, an employee of the Yale University Animal Research Center, located at 10 Amistad Street, New Haven Connecticut, the Animal Research Center. Clark is an Animal Technician and has worked for Yale University for the past five years. Clark reported that his assignment on September 8th was to maintain the animals in rooms G13, G24, and G33.

Clark also stated he met Annie Le sometime after the beginning of 2009. Clark estimated that he has known Le for a minimum of four months. Clark does not socialize with Annie Le and had never had contact with her outside of a work setting. Clark recalled that two of the primary labs which used animals at the Amistad facility were the Assessa lab, which utilized room G33 and the Bennett lab, which utilized room G13. Annie Le worked for the Bennett lab.

Clark stated that on Tuesday September 8th 2009, he arrived for work at approximately 7:00 a.m. and that key card access is needed to enter the various room where the animals are housed in the basement of the Arnistad buildings. On Tuesday, Clark was responsible for maintaining the animals in room G24, G33, and G13 (Bennett lab).


At approximately 10:30hrs, he observed Le working in room G13 wearing a brown skirt and yellow lab coat. Clark reported that he left room G13 for lunch at approximately 12:00hrs and later returned at approximately 12:30hrs. Clark explained seeing Le gathering up her belongings and leaving the room between 12:30hrs and 12:45hrs carrying her notebook and two bags of mouse food. Clark reported that a fire alarm cleared the building between 13:00hrs and 13:30hrs. Investigators observed Clark to have a scratch on his face and left bicep that he reported was sustained at home from one of his cats.

On September 12, 2009 Investigators from the Connecticut State Police Western District Major Crime Squad processed the lower floor at 10 Amistad St Animal Research Center for physical evidence related to this investigation.

Utilizing a presumptive chemical tests. Particularly, investigators located one rubber glove with blood-like stains, one low cut white athletic sock with hairs and blood-like stains both found placed inside of a drop ceiling, and a pair of "Vikings" brand work boots with blood-like stains labeled "Ray-C" written on the back of the boot, and one blue short-sleeved hospital scrub with blood-like stains. Video surveillance revealed similar type shirt worn by Raymond Clark. Through chemical analysis investigators uncovered blood-like stains that had been cleaned off in room G-22. Room G-13 revealed medium velocity blood-like spray pattern on the wall which had been cleaned off. These stains were tested using presumptive chemical testing which showed a positive reaction for the presence of blood. Currently some of these items are being compared and tested for the presence of DNA by the State of Connecticut Forensic Laboratory located in Meriden.

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On September 13th, 2009, Investigators inspected the locker room located on lower level floor at 10 Amistad Street. Upon entering this locker room, an odor similar to that of a decomposing body was immediately detected and as a result investigators keyed in to the source of the odor. Cadaver K9 were brought into the area and began to immediately alert to the presence of a decomposing body. A systematic search of the room eventually revealed the lifeless body of a female, believed to be Annie Le, concealed within a wall directly behind the toilet. A mechanical chase was located directly behind the toilet. Investigators removed the access panel to the mechanical chase and immediately observed blood like smears throughout the opening, behind the door frame, on pipe insulation and the access panel. Loose insulation was removed from the inside opening of the mechanical chase and placed on top of the female body in order to conceal her.

They also noted that she

was wearing surgical gloves with her left thumb exposed. Upon the removal of the victim numerous items of evidentiary value were seized from the exposed wall cavity.

A subsequent autopsy conducted at the State of Connecticut Medical Examiner's office revealed that the lifeless body was that of Annie Le. The cause of death was ruled a Homicide.

These items were photographed for a later comparison to the beads recovered from room G22.

As mentioned previously, Agents from the Federal Bureau of Investigations obtained detailed records of the electronic security swipe key-cards used by all employees during days leading into September 8th, 2009 and the day thereof. On September 8th, Annie Le is recorded using the key-card only three times. Her last entry was recorded at 10:11:50 am, accessing room G13.

Analysis conducted on Raymond Clark's electronic key-card showed an increase in use between August 27th, 2009 and September 8th, of rooms G13 and G22. Investigators noted that on September 8th, the date of Annie Le's disappearance, Raymond Clark's repeated usage of his key-card in rooms G13, and G22 both in close proximity to each other. This use was substantially higher in comparison to his prior use. For example, between August 27th, 2009 and September 8th Raymond Clark's key-card is only use in room G22 three times. On September 8th he used his key-card in room G22 eleven times. Additionally, Raymond Clark's key-card accessed room G13 between August 29th, 2009 and September 7th only once. On September 8th, Raymond Clark's key-card accessed room G13 five times. Of particular note Raymond Clark is the only individual shown to have used his key-card to access room G22 after Annie Le's entry.

Raymond Clark's key-card is recorded entering room G13 at 10:40:59 am. At 11:04:37 am, Raymond Clark's key-card is recorded reentering room G13 and is not recorded swiping in any other locations for 46 minutes. Furthermore, Raymond Clark's key-card is the only card after Annie Le swiped into the Amistad building that accessed room G22 on September 8th, where the above described evidence is located.

A significant amount of physical evidence was seized from room G22 which included a cleaning spray bottle with blood like stains, two small round red necklace beads, hair fibers and aspirated blood stains on an interior wall in said room which presumptively tested positive for the presence of blood. Also, Affiant Vazquez visually compared photographs of the two necklace beads found within room G22 and the necklace bead found within the clothing discovered with Annie Le's body which appeared to be similar to each other.



Wherefore the undersigned requests that a warrant may issue commanding a proper officer to search said person or to enter into or upon said place or thing, search the same, and take into custody all such property.

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A lab coat was seized from 10 Amistad Street and submitted to the State Forensic Laboratory for testing. The examination revealed that there was DNA profile from an unknown male and the DNA profile from Annie Le present on a few areas of the lab coat.

While turning towards Officer Wood, Raymond imoved the box of wipes from the far left corner to the far right corner and purposely turned the box so that the blood splatter was facing to the right hand side of the cart away from plain sight. Once Raymond moved the box of wipes, he then leaned up against the cart and made small talk with Officer Wood. At this point F.B.I Special Agent Jim Wines and Special Agent Lisa MacNamara came into G-13. The Agents briefly spoke with Officer Wood and then asked Raymond to exit G-13. 
Some items have tested positive for the presence of blood utilizing a presumptive chemical tests. Particularly, investigators located one rubber glove with blood-like stains, one low cut white athletic sock with hairs and blood-like stains both found placed inside of a drop ceiling, and a pair of "Vikings" brand work boots with blood-like stains labeled "Ray-C" written on the back of the boot with missing shoe laces, and one blue short-sleeved hospital scrub with blood-like stains. On September 13th, 2009, Investigators inspected the locker room located on lower level floor at 10. Amistad Street. Upon entering this locker room, an odor similar to that of a decomposing body was immediately detected and as a result investigators keyed in to the source of the odor. Cadaver K9 were brought into the area and began to immediately alert to the presence of a decomposing body. A systematic search of the room eventually revealed the lifeless body of a female, believed to be Annie Le, concealed within a wall directly behind the toilet. A mechanical chase was located directly behind the toilet. Investigators removed the access panel to the mechanical chase and immediately observed blood like smears throughout the opening, behind the door frame, on pipe insulation and the access panel. Loose insulation was removed from the inside opening of the mechanical chase and placed on top of the female body in order to conceal her.

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

Special Agent James Wines of the Federal Bureau of Investigation New Haven office obtained and viewed video footage showing Raymond J, Clark's movements from the time he left 10 Amistad Street to the point he is picked up in a red Ford Taurus on September 8^{th.} 2009.

The video depicts Raymond Clark exiting the main front doors of 10 Amistad Street at about 1554hrs. Clark was seen wearing a dark tee-shirt, jeans, white sneakers and a dark colored hat with a light colored logo on it. He walked North on Cedar Street from Amistad Street. At about 1600hrs, Clark sits at a table near the corner of Cedar Street and Congress Avenue. At 1601hrs, Clark enters the coffee shop located on this corner. 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to include video footage from exterior surrounding areas showed that Annie Le never exited 10 Amistad Street since her arrival on September 8th, 2009. Agents from the Federal Bureau of Identification confirmed that all exits from 10 Amistad Street are covered by video surveillance.

Investigators also reviewed Raymond Clark's electronic key-card which showed an increase in usage between August 27th, 2009 and September 8th, of rooms G13 and G22. Investigators noted that on September 8th, the date of Annie Le's disappearance, Raymond Clark's repeated usage of his key-card in rooms G13, and G22 both in close proximity to each other. This use was substantially higher in comparison to his prior use. For example, between August 27th, 2009 and September 8th Raymond Clark's key-card is only used in room G22 three times. On September 8th he used his key-card in room G22 eleven times. Additionally, Raymond Clark's key-card accessed room G13 between August 29th, 2009 and September 7th only once. On September 8th, Raymond Clark's key-card accessed room G13 five times. Of particular note Raymond Clark is the only individual shown to have used his key-card to access room G22 after Annie Le's entry into G13. A significant amount of evidence was seized from room G22, the room with the increase usage by Raymond J. Clark on September 8th.

As a result, investigators from the Connecticut State Police Central and Western District Major Crime Squads processed the lower floor at 10 Amistad Street Animal Research Center, 40 Ferry Street apartment 1A in Middletown Connecticut, a 2000 Ford Mustang two door, color red bearing Connecticut registration 543-TVS with V.I.N. 1FAFP4048YF103973, and the person of Raymond J. Clark for physical evidence related to this investigation. These searches have resulted in the seizure of numerous items containing physical evidence and trace evidence of blood, biological fluids, hairs and fibers. Some of these items were sent to the State of Connecticut Forensic Laboratory located in Meriden for testing and comparison for the presence of DNA. As of this date, several tested items of evidentiary value have linked Raymond J. Clark to key pieces of evidence which ultimately led to his arrest on September 17th, 2009.

On September 20th, the night sanitation crew located a clogged drain at 10 Amistad Street Animal Research Center. Members of the Major Crimes Squad Central division responded and eventually retrieved medical scrub tops stuffed into the drain pipe. These items were collected as evidence and will be tested by the Connecticut State Forensic Laboratory on a later time.

Furthermore, on September 22nd, 2008, these affiants were summoned back to 10 Amistad Street the Animal Lab Research Center on reports of evidence-like items found stuffed in a drain pipe located in the auto-clave room separate to that of the above stated room. Upon arrival we were directed to the area in questioned and shown a large empty plastic bag, a white rag, tweezers, one scissor and several Eppendorf plastic tubes. These items were past the debris collection basket which meant that in order to place these items in the manner they were

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found in the drain pipe someone would have to remove the debris basket and discard said items into the drain pipe.

In an attempt to discover further evidence, water that was pooled in the trap portion of the drain pipe was removed which led to the discovery of a screwdriver sitting at the bottom of the pipe. We were also informed by Barry Wong, who is employed by Yale University as a Sanitation Department night team leader, that on September 11th he noticed that the drain pipe was clogged but did not report the incident until the 22nd when again he had problems with the drain. In an attempt to clear the clog he had plumbers clear the blockage which revealed the above stated items.

Although extensive searches have been conducted some items of evidentiary value remain missing and are listed as follows: Raymond J. Clark's lanyard along with his electronic key-card used to access various rooms throughout said facility, a pair of dark color female mule type shoe worn by the victim on the day of her disappearance, shoe laces for the work boots seized from the bathroom locker room which contained blood-like stains, small reddish necklace beads from a necklace worn and found on Annie Le's body at the time of her discovery, black T-shirt, blue jeans, black with white stripe long sleeve jacket seen on video worn by Raymond J. Clark's person on September 8th, a brown colored leather computation notebook belonging to Annie Le and used by her during her daily activities at 10 Amistad Street.

As result of the above findings, these affiants believe that items of evidentiary value have been discarded throughout various points within 10 Amistad Street lower-level Yale Animal Research Center. For instance items of evidence have been found in ceiling tiles, laundry bags, secreted in walls, and in drain pipes. Furthermore the perpetrator has gone to great lengths to conceal evidence in multiple locations in unusual places. Some of these areas have been thoroughly searched and produced items of evidentiary value. However, as of September 23rd, an inspection of the facility has revealed that two women's locker room containing lockers have not been searched. One of these locker rooms is labeled G-30c located in the Yale Animal Research Center while the other is labeled as G-30e located on the investigators side of the animal Research Center. Both locker rooms contain lockers, some of which are locked by padlocks and dial type locks while others have no locks. Some are labeled with names while others are not. The undersigned, Detective Sergeant Alfonso Vazquez, being duly sworn, does depose and state that he is a member of the New Haven Police Department since January 24, 1992. At all times mentioned herein, I was acting as a member of said department. The following facts and circumstances are stated from personal knowledge and observations, as well as information received from other police officers acting in their official capacity and from official police reports and statements made from prudent and credible witnesses.

The undersigned, Detective Scott Branfuhr, being duly sworn, does depose and state that he is a member of the New Haven Police Department since July 29, 1989. At all times mentioned herein, I was acting as a member of said department. The following facts and circumstances are stated from personal knowledge and observations, as well as information received from other police officers acting in their official capacity and from official police reports and statements made from prudent and credible witnesses.

On September 8th 2009, at approximately 10:40 pm, Yale University Police Officers responded to 188 Lawrence St Apt 3 New Haven, CT to investigate a missing person complaint. Officers met with Natalie Powers who reported that her roommate, Annie Le, did not return home after her last class. Powers said she had not received any phone calls from Le on this day which was very unusual.

A subsequent joint investigation conducted by members of the Federal Bureau of Investigation New Haven field office, the Yale University Police Department and the New Haven Police Department led to interviews of friends and family of Annie Le who all confirmed her disappearance. The investigation also showed that Annie Le worked at the Yale Animal Research Center located at 10 Amistad Street, lower level.

Investigators from the Federal Bureau of Investigation New Haven Field Office, the Yale Police Department and the New Haven Police Department reviewed, among other things, electronic video surveillance of 10 Amistad Street and security key-card usage by Annie Le. Video footage showed Annie Le entering 10 Amistad Street on September 8th, 2009, at approximately 10:09 am. A printout of Ms Le's electronic key card log for September 8th 2009 showed that her card was last used on September 8th 2009 at 10:11 am, at the Yale Animal Research Center, room G-13, located at 10 Amistad Street lower level. Further review of all security cameras both interior and exterior to include video footage from exterior surrounding areas showed that Annie Le never exited 10 Amistad Street since her arrival on September 8th, 2009. The FBI confirmed that all exits from 10 Amistad Street are covered by video surveillance.

On Wednesday September 10th, 2009, Officer Sabrina Wood from the Yale Police Department was approached by Rachel Roth, a graduate student and Coworker of Annie Le. Roth showed Officer Wood a box of "WIPE ALLS," that had what appeared to be blood splatter. The box of wipes was on a steel push cart located inside of lab room G-13. Officer Wood stood guard and awaited the arrival of Agents from the Federal Bureau of Investigation.

Wherefore the undersigned requests that a warrant may issue commanding a proper officer to search said person or to enter into or upon said place or thing, search the same, and take into custody all such property.

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While waiting for the F.B.I. a lab technician, later identified as Raymond Clark, came in and out of G-13 several times. During one of the times he came into the room, Raymond walked over to the cart and looked at the box of wipes. Raymond then stood between Officer Wood and the cart, and then turned and faced Officer Wood. While turning towards Officer Wood, Raymond moved the box of wipes from the far left corner to the far right corner and purposely turned the box so that the blood splatter was facing to the right hand side of the cart away from plain sight. Once Raymond moved the box of wipes, he then leaned up against the cart and made small talk with Officer Wood. At this point F.B.I Special Agent Jim Wines and Special Agent Lisa MacNamara came into G-13. The Agents briefly spoke with Officer Wood and then asked Raymond to exit G-13. When Raymond left the room, Officers Wood moved the wipes box back to its original position on the cart. Officer Wood moved the tissue box by pushing it with her fingernail.

Sometime later, Raymond Clark came back into the room and began scrubbing the floor grate/drain with the SOS pads and cleaning solution. Officer Wood thought it was unusual that Raymond was scrubbing the drain because it did not appear to need cleaning.

In a subsequent interview Agents also spoke with Sergeant Jay Jones of the Yale Police Department. Sergeant Jones confirmed seeing Raymond Clark on the floor inside the G-13 lab scrubbing the floor underneath the sink, near the drain. Clark was using a cleansing pad or brush to clean the floor. Sergeant Jones thought this was odd because the floor was clean. Sergeant Jones did not observe anything that needed cleaning.

Sergeant Jones also stated he saw Raymond Clark walk past the cart that had the tissue box on it in lab room G-13 and make contact with the cart. Sergeant Jones stated that at some other point Raymond Clark did accidently bump the tissue box, however, the integrity of the evidence was not disturbed.

On September 10, 2009, at approximately 3:10 pm, members of the Federal Bureau of Investigation New Haven Field Office Evidence Response Team collected the above referenced box. Said box was subsequently submitted to the State of Connecticut Forensic Laboratory for examination. The preliminary result of the examination of the blood spatter tested positive for the presence of human blood.

Officer Jennifer Garcia, Yale University Police Officer, spoke with Agents of the New Haven Federal Bureau of Investigations field office and stated that while responding to the basement of 10 Amistad Animal Research Center a male named Raymond Clark approached her and stated he knew Annie Le. Raymond Clark stated that he left the Amistad building at 12:45 pm on September 08th, 2009. According to Raymond Clark, Annie Le left the building 15 minutes before him and before the fire alarm was tripped. Garcia also added that Raymond Clark changed his clothes at least once when the F.B.I was processing the scene.

Wherefore the undersigned requests that a warrant may issue commanding a proper officer to search said person or to enter into or upon said place or thing, search the same, and take into custody all such property.

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As part of the investigation investigators spoke with co-workers of Annie Le. Particularly, on September 10th 2009, investigators from the Federal Bureau of Investigation met with Clark, an employee of the Yale University Animal Research Center, located at 10 Amistad Street, New Haven Connecticut, the Animal Research Center. Clark is an Animal Technician and has worked for Yale University for the past five years. Clark reported that his assignment on September 8th was to maintain the animals in rooms G13, G24, and G33.

Clark also stated he met Annie Le sometime after the beginning of 2009. Clark estimated that he has known Le for a minimum of four months. Clark does not socialize with Annie Le and had never had contact with her outside of a work setting. Clark recalled that two of the primary labs which used animals at the Amistad facility were the Assessa lab, which utilized room G33 and the Bennett lab, which utilized room G13. Annie Le worked for the Bennett lab.

Clark stated that on Tuesday September 8th 2009, he arrived for work at approximately 7:00 a.m. and that key card access is needed to enter the various rooms where the animals are housed in the basement of the Amistad buildings. On Tuesday, Clark was responsible for maintaining the animals in room G24, G33, and G13 (Bennett lab).

At approximately 10:30hrs, he observed Le working in room G13 wearing a brown skirt and yellow lab coat. Clark reported that he left room G13 for lunch at approximately 12:00hrs and later returned at approximately 12:30hrs. Clark explained seeing Le gathering up her belongings and leaving the room between 12:30hrs and 12:45hrs carrying her notebook and two bags of mouse food. Clark reported that a fire alarm cleared the building between 13:00hrs and 13:30hrs. Investigators observed Clark to have a scratch on his face and left bicep that he reported was sustained at home from one of his cats.


On September 12, 2009 Investigators from the Connecticut State Police Western District Major Crime Squad processed the lower floor at 10 Amistad St Animal Research Center for physical evidence related to this investigation.

Some items have tested positive for the presence of blood utilizing a presumptive chemical tests. Particularly, investigators located one rubber glove with blood-like stains, one low cut white athletic sock with hairs and blood-like stains both found placed inside of a drop ceiling, and a pair of "Vikings" brand work boots with blood-like stains labeled "Ray-C" written on the back of the boot with missing shoe laces, and one blue short-sleeved hospital scrub with blood-like stains. Video surveillance revealed similar type shirt worn by Raymond Clark. Through chemical analysis investigators uncovered blood-like stains that had been cleaned off in room G-22. Room G-13 revealed medium velocity blood-like spray pattern on the wall which had been cleaned off. These stains were tested using presumptive chemical testing which showed a positive reaction for the presence of blood.

Wherefore the undersigned requests that a warrant may issue commanding a proper officer to search said person or to enter into or upon said place or thing, search the same, and take into custody all such property.

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Currently some of these items are being compared and tested for the presence of DNA by the State of Connecticut Forensic Laboratory located in Meriden.



On September 13th, 2009, Investigators inspected the locker room located on lower level floor at 10 Amistad Street. Upon entering this locker room, an odor similar to that of a decomposing body was immediately detected and as a result investigators keyed in to the source of the odor. Cadaver K9 were brought into the area and began to immediately alert to the presence of a decomposing body. A systematic search of the room eventually revealed the lifeless body of a female, believed to be Annie Le, concealed within a wall directly behind the toilet. A mechanical chase was located directly behind the toilet. Investigators removed the access panel to the mechanical chase and immediately observed blood like smears throughout the opening, behind the door frame, on pipe insulation and the access panel. Loose insulation was removed from the inside opening of the mechanical chase and placed on top of the female body in order to conceal her.

was wearing surgical gloves with her left thumb exposed. Upon the removal of the victim numerous items of evidentiary value were seized from the exposed wall cavity.

A subsequent autopsy conducted at the State of Connecticut Medical Examiner's office revealed that the lifeless body was that of Annie Le. The cause of death was ruled a Homicide.

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Examiners' office the clothing she was wearing. Upon his return back to the New Haven Police Department's Investigative Division he noted a round reddish tone necklace bead along with a broken string necklace contained within the clothing of Annie Le. These items were photographed for a later comparison to the beads recovered from room G22.

As mentioned previously, Agents from the Federal Bureau of Investigations obtained detailed records of the electronic security swipe key-cards used by all employees during days leading into September 8th, 2009 and the day thereof. On September 8th, Annie Le is recorded using the key-card only three times. Her last entry was recorded at 10:11:50 am, accessing room G13.

Analysis conducted on Raymond Clark's electronic key-card showed an increase in use between August 27th, 2009 and September 8th of rooms G13 and G22. Investigators noted that on September 8th, the date of Annie Le's disappearance, Raymond Clark's repeated usage of his key-card in rooms G13, and G22 both in close proximity to each other. This use was substantially higher in comparison to his prior use. For example, between August 27th, 2009 and September 8th Raymond Clark's key-card is only use in room G22 three times. On September 8th he used his key-card in room G22 eleven times. Additionally, Raymond Clark's key-card accessed room G13 between August 29th, 2009 and September 7th only once. On September 8th, Raymond Clark's key-card accessed room G13 five times. Of particular note Raymond Clark is the only individual shown to have used his key-card to access room G22 after Annie Le's entry.


Raymond Clark's key-card is recorded entering room G13 at 10:40:59 am. At 11:04:37 am, Raymond Clark's key-card is recorded reentering room G13 and is not recorded swiping in any other locations for 46 minutes. Furthermore, Raymond Clark's key-card is the only card after Annie Le swiped into the Amistad building that accessed room G22 on September 8th, where the above described evidence is located.

A significant amount of physical evidence was seized from room G22 which included a cleaning spray bottle with blood like stains, two small round red necklace beads, hair fibers and aspirated blood stains on an interior wall in said room which presumptively tested positive for the presence of blood. Also, Affiant Vazquez visually compared photographs of the two necklace beads found within room G22 and the necklace bead found within the clothing discovered with Annie Le's body which appeared to be similar to each other.



Wherefore the undersigned requests that a warrant may issue commanding a proper officer to search said person or to enter into or upon said place or fitting, search the same, and take into custody all such property.

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A lab coat was seized from 10 Amistad Street and submitted to the State Forensic Laboratory for testing. The examination revealed that there was DNA profile from an unknown male and the DNA profile from Annie Le present on a few areas of the lab coat.

Through this investigation and upon reviewing sign-in schedule task sheets specific to rooms G23, G25, G27, and G29 an individual signed in on September 8th using the initials "RC" with a green inked pen.

During the search of lockers located in the lower level of 10 Amistad Street investigators located Annie Le's e-mail address within a locker labeled "RAY" on the front door. Upon reviewing video footage on September 8th 2009 of 10 Amistad Street Raymond Clark is seen entering 10 Amistad Street at 7:05 am clad in a black long sleeve jacket with white stripes and white sneakers. Upon terminating for the day Raymond Clark was seen clad in a black T-shirt and blue jeans. The jacket has not been located after an extensive evidentiary search of 10 Amistad Street. Furthermore, video footage showed Annie Le entering 10 Amistad Street on September 8th, 2009 wearing dark in color mule style shoes. A search of the lower level of 10 Amistad Street has failed to reveal Annie Le's shoes. On September 8th at approximately 7:05 am Raymond Clark is seen entering into 10 Amistad Street wearing a metallic mans' watch.

Through this investigation it was learned that Annie Le is always in possession of a brown colored leather computation notebook which she uses to record data from her experiments. An extensive search of the crime scene has failed to locate said notebook.

These affiants have personal knowledge, based upon their training and experience, that crimes of violence involve a struggle, a break, the use of weapons and other instrumentalities, and/or the element of unpredictability; the person or persons participating in the commission of a violent crime is/are in contact with physical surrounding in a forceful or otherwise detectable manner; there is often an attempt to alter, destroy, remove, clean up, or cover up evidence of a crime; items of evidentiary value are commonly located in the home of the suspect; traces may be left in the form of blood, saliva, hair, fibers, fingerprints, palmprints, DNA and bodily injuries; many of the above items are minute and must be analyzed by the state forensic laboratories.

These affiants also have personal knowledge, based upon their training and experience, that a crime scene, such as described above, will contain physical evidence, hereinbefore itemized, which will aid in establishing the identity of the perpetrator(s), the circumstances under which the crime was committed, and/or which in general will assist in the discovery of the pertinent facts and that such evidence requires a systematic search to locate, seize, record and process.

Investigators also reviewed Raymond Clark's electronic key-card which showed an increase in use between August 27th, 2009 and September 8th, of rooms G13 and G22. Investigators noted that on September 8th, the date of Annie Le's disappearance, Raymond Clark's repeated usage of his key-card in rooms G13, and G22 both in close proximity to each other. This use was substantially higher in comparison to his prior use. For example, between August 27th, 2009 and September 8th Raymond Clark's key-card is only used in room G22 three times.
